

Finding a job in Portugal

Bear in mind!

- Job seeking abroad requires **more time** and **preparation** than in your own country
- Your move will be much smoother if you are properly informed

EURES services can help you with:

- information about the Portuguese labour market
- looking for jobs
- applying for a job
- preparing for interviews







First, focus on yourself

Think about:

- your starting point: interests, education, professional experience, language skills, current family and professional situation...
- what drives your move to Portugal?
- what are your professional goals?
- looking for a short-term experience or a long-term project?
- what are you willing to negotiate?
- do you see yourself working for a company or as an entrepreneur?
- what support do you already have in Portugal?







Second, get information about

- Living conditions
 - cost of living
 - accommodation
 - access to healthcare & education
- Where, when, how you can learn Portuguese
- Labour market and job opportunities
- Do you need professional recognition to work?

Your job search: when in Portugal...



- Register ASAP at the <u>nearest Job Centre</u>
- Required document(s):
 - o ID card, or
 - Passport, or
 - Residence * | Work Permit, or Job Search Visa (if you are a non-EU/EEA citizen)
- If an **unemployment benefit recipient** in your country of origin, <u>bring the U2 Portable Document</u>
- Enrol in Portuguese courses for foreigners

- cover letter
- references
- diplomas, certificates, ...





How to apply...

Curriculum Vitae



- reverse chronological order or functional model, or a mix
- infographic and creative CVs
- <u>Europass CV</u>
- 1-2 pages maximum, short, concise, structured
- professional (smiling) photo
- highlight your understanding of other cultures and your international experience
- mobile: include your country's **international code number** (e.g. +32)
- Language and IT skills
- include **LinkedIn profile** & **links** to your former employers' websites & courses content
- tools to use videoconference (Teams, Zoom,...)







How to apply...



Cover | Motivation "Letter"

- an e-mail (to which you attach your CV)
- personalize find a contact person (head of HR)
- 2-3 paragraphs
- keywords
- your story and how it relates to the company's story
- personal branding: balance facts & motivation
- don't repeat Information already on the CV
- your availability for an (online) interview







The Cover Letter

- show your interest in the position / company shortly write about the company and the job position
- highlight your skills write about main experiences where you gained or already proved the qualities and skills that are required for the position
- let them know your motivation why do you want this job? what inspires you about this position and the company? Why do you want to move to Portugal?
- mention which added values you'll bring them, but also what you can learn from them

Recruiters may google you!

If you have public profiles

be aware of the contents you share!









...an important tool

- increasingly used to recruit qualified workers
- find out more about your professional activity and skills
- get an inside look into your interests and preferences
- make sure that your LinkedIn profile is up-to-date
- follow top companies in the field of your work
- personalize your public profile URL http://www.linkedin.com/in/your name
- create a QR Code for your LinkedIn accountprofile

How to stand out?

tailor-made for a particular company and specific job vacancy

- research the company
- think about "Are you a match?"
- make it easy-to-read
- don't use only copy&paste on templates, make them your own
- represent yourself
