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

Labour Market situation

Unemployment rate

- Highest
 Tourism & Transport 4,8%
 Construction 5,7 %
 Social workers 3,6%
- Lowest
 Education 0,8%
 Academic work 0,9%
 Health 1,3%
 Engineers & ICT 2,2%





Labour Market – Shortages

- Health sector
 - Doctors,
 - Pharmacists
 - Specialised nurses
- Hotel and Tourism
 - chefs and waiters (seasonal)
- Pre-School Teachers
- Construction Sector
 - Highly skilled workers only
- Transport
 - Bus drivers and lorry drivers in certain regions

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What are the companies looking for?

- The Norwegian companies accept in general both Bachelor and Master's degree candidates, but the majority seems to recruit candidates with a Masters degree. Most important is technical competence!
- Preferably 3-5 years of experience as a minimum
- When reading a CV, a Norwegian recruiter will first of all look for the technical competence of the candidate.
- Solid Norwegian and or English skills (depending on the sector)



What are the companies looking for?

- Most companies will expect candidates to learn
 Norwegian after arrival. (No free language courses)
- Motivation to work for THEIR company
- Dedicated professionals
- Motivation for integration within the work environment
- The candidates' real motivation for relocation to Norway



What do the companies offer?

- Often permanent positions, but not always
- Sometimes a relocation package
- The "Scandinavian way of life"
 - balanced work/private life with normal working hours being 37.5-40 hours/week
- Good possibilities of developing skills within your field
- Comfortable salaries yet not the best in Europe
- Fringe benefits are quite common
 - discount membership at gym, office at home, "flexi hours"



Working conditions

- Written contract is mandatory.
- 6 months probation period.
- Period of notice.
 - 3 months.
 - 2 weeks during probation.
- Salary paid once a month.
- Employer draws <u>tax</u> from your monthly pay.
- 39 working hours per week.
 - Including ½ hour lunch
 - Maximum 40 hours per week.



Salaries

- In Norway there is no legal minimum wage that applies for all branches and professions.
- Employers and unions regularly negotiate wages and working conditions, resulting in a wage agreement (tariffavtale).
- Member companies then commit themselves to pay wages according to agreement for your occupation.

Expenses

- Standard Budget
 - visit <u>www.sifo.no</u>, click on English and Standard Budget.
- Accommodation
 - Visit <u>www.finn.no</u>, click on *Eiendom* and *Bolig til Leie* and select the region or town.
 - Smaller locations = lower rent
- Medical expenses are covered by the state, if you are a tax payer.
 - You are required to pay small amounts.
 - Some medicines are subsidised and some not.
 - Dentistry is not covered.



Cultural differences

- Norway has very low hierarchy.
- Employees are encouraged to show self initiative.
- Communication at the work place is more or less informal.
- With low hierarchy, it is also easy to talk to the manager, the project manager or the team manager directly.
- Nearly no hand shakes, unless you meet someone for the first time.





Residence/Registration

- Norway is an EEA (not EU) member
- EU/EEA citizen have the right to work in Norway from the first day of arrival.
- Website: <u>www.workinnorway.no</u>
- Job holders must register with <u>UDI</u>:
 - Register online, at the nearest police station or <u>Service Centre</u> for Foreign workers (SAU.no)
- Job seekers self-register only when staying longer than 3 months.
- You will also need a <u>National Identification number</u>
 - Tax office/population register <u>www.skateetaten.no</u>
