EMPLOYMENT PROSPECTS

Being attracted to Italy by its weather, cuisine, wine and lifestyle is laudable but doesn't rate highly as an employment qualification.

It's extremely difficult to find work in rural areas and isn't easy in cities (even Rome or Milan), especially if your **Italian isn't fluent**.

You shouldn't count on being able to obtain employment in Italy unless you've a firm job offer or special qualifications or experience for which there's a strong demand.

If you want a good job you must usually be well qualified and speak fluent Italian.

If you intend to arrive in Italy without a job, it's wise to have a plan for finding employment on arrival and to try to make some contacts before you arrive.










EURES - European Job Mobility Portal - job vacancies, living and working conditions, and labour market in Italy, as well as a CV-posting service for jobseekers.









Provides a list of Job Centres (Centri per l'Impiego, every Job Centre has an assigned geographical area but if you want to find a job you can go everywhere), job vacancies and CVposting service for jobseekers (in Italian).

It could be useful to search for a job centre with an Eures adviser who knows English







The Job Centers in Italy

The Job Centres are coordinated at territorial level by the regions. They are an important point of reference in the provision of services for all jobseekers.

Each Italian region has a regional portal to keep users updated on job opportunities and new regulations in their respective territories.





Job hunting includes the following resources:

Newspapers

Most national, regional and local newspapers contain a situations vacant or jobs section (Offerte di Lavoro or Offerte di Collaborazione) on certain days of the week. Most major newspapers and magazines have websites where you can usually access their 'situations vacant' sections free of charge and local and national newspapers are available in libraries, bars and cafés in Italy, so you don't always need to buy them.

Information Centres And Libraries

Local information centres (*informagiovani*) are useful for information about jobs, job hunting, education and training, for more details visit their website (<u>www.informagiovani.it</u>). Main libraries also provide a range of resources for job seekers, although they don't specifically provide advice and assistance for the unemployed, as in some other countries.

Chambers Of Commerce

Foreign chambers of commerce (*camera di commercio*) in Italy maintain lists of their member companies doing business (or with subsidiaries) in Italy. . *Infoimprese* (<u>www.infoimprese.it</u>) is a useful website of Italian chambers of commerce with information on companies.

Internet

The Internet provides access to hundreds of sites for job-seekers, including corporate websites, recruitment companies and newspaper job advertisements (you can use a search engine to find them).

Networking

Networking basically involves getting together with like-minded people to discuss business. It's particularly useful in Italy, where people use personal contacts for everything from looking for jobs to finding accommodation.

SOME USEFUL TIPS BEFORE MOVING...

- Read the employment contract carefully (rights and responsibilities)
- Before accepting the job, make sure you get the terms and conditions of work from your employer
- Before setting out verify who is responsible for travel and accommodation expenses
- Ask how and how often you will be paid and check your budget

- Your CV and cover letter in Italian, reference letters from previous employers and any relevant certificates etc.
- European Health Card
- Other certificates or licences
